## Shockoe Hill Cemetery

The City of Richmond opened this cemetery in 1822 after the grounds at St. John's Church neared capacity. The cemetery is still city-owned. Burials are available only to family members in existing family plots.

Among the notables interred here...(see map on reverse)

- 1. John Marshall (1755-1835): Though a Revolutionary soldier, Congressman and Secretary of State, it was as third Chief Justice (1801-35) that Marshall most influenced his nation's future. In Marbury v. Madison and other decisions, he ensured the judicial branch was co-equal to the executive & legislative branches.
- Elizabeth Van Lew (1818-1900): Abolitionist and Union spy; organized informants network, and assisted Union prisoners. President Grant made her City Postmistress, noting she gave "the most valuable intelligence from Richmond during the War."
- Peter Francisco (1760-1831): Known as the "Sampson of the American Revolution;" celebrated by Washington and others for feats of strength and bravery.
- 4. John Wickham (1763-1839): Prominent lawyer; defended Aaron Burr in his1807 treason trial, presided over by John Marshall. Granddaughter Charlotte, who married R. E. Lee's son Rooney, is here with her two children; all three died during the War.
- 5. Jane Stanard: The family friend and object of desire referred to by E.A. Poe in his poem, "To Helen." As a teenager, he spent many nights here pining at her grave.
- 6. Many unmarked Confederate and other graves are in this deceptively open area; not sold by plot, but used for single burials. Hundreds of Union POWs long believed here were actually buried to the east, across 4<sup>th</sup> St. (and later moved.) A marker placed by the Military Order of the Loyal Legion honors them.
- 7. John D. Blair (1758-1823): Prominent Presbyterian minister and city leader.
- 8. William Foushee (1749-1824): The first mayor of the City of Richmond (1782).
- 9. James Gibbon (1758-1835): As a Pennsylvania infantry officer he helped win at Stony Point (N.Y.) in 1779. Later the Customs Collector for the Port of Richmond.
- 10. William H. Cabell (1772-1853): Governor of Virginia (1805-08); assisted with the founding of the University of Virginia.
- 11. John Mercer Patton (1797-1858): Congressman (1830-38); Provisional Governor (1841); revised Va's. Code (1850). A great-grandfather of Gen. George S. Patton.
- 12. Charles Bell Gibson (1816-1865): Surgeon-General of Virginia (1861). From 1861 to 1864, he ran C.S.A General Hospital. #1, in the large brick building just to the north. Performed Virginia's first surgery under general anesthesia (1848).
- 13. Johnson Jones Hooper (1815–1862): Noted mid–19th century humorist, admired by Twain and Harte; served as Sec. of the Provisional C.S.A. Congress (1861–1862).
- 14. John Allan (1780-1834): He was an often-contentious foster father to Poe.
- 15. Sarah Elmira Royster Shelton (1810-1888): Beloved of Poe as a teenager, and again in the weeks before his death.
- 16. John Minor Botts (1802-1869): Congressman (1839-43, '47-'49), leading Southern Unionist & foe of the C.S.A. gov't. Orphaned in the 1811 Theater Fire.
- 17. Powhatan Ellis (1790-1863): U.S. Senator (Miss.), federal judge, Envoy to Mexico.
- 18. Daniel Norton (1794–1847): Richmond agronomist; developed the diseaseresistant Norton grape, now a standard wine grape throughout the U.S.


